1930's	Constructed Two Bridges over Scott's Creek: * Typical bridge useful life = 50 yrs. * This project will: * Upgrade bridge west of Sylva Fire Dept, which is north of the Coffee Shop Restaurant * Replace Bridge east of Jackson Paper Mill
1980's	NC 107 Transportation Issues Realized: * Crash rates - among highest in State * Existing road (48 FT wide) was only a 4 lanes - no dedicated middle turn lane
mid 1990's	NC 107 Improvements: * Restriped to 5 lanes to add center turn lane (Kept 48 FT roadway width) * Improved crash rates * Yet traffic "worsened" with continued development * Local officials requested study for ways to "fix NC 107"
1995	Traffic conditions "worsens" * Plan of "Southern Loop" added to bypass central Sylva & Dillsboro
2002	Smart Roads Alliance formed: * Citizens against the Sylva area's roadway improvements
2003	NCDOT completed the first feasibility study: "Southern Loop" * Recommended: multi-lane roadway connecting US 23-441 south of Dillsboro to US 23-74 east of Sylva. * STIP added "Southern Loop" as R-4745 * Some community concerns included: 1. Impact to environment & private property 2. Would harm local business-reduced traffic
2008	NCDOT removed R-4745 western's half of the "Southern Loop" * Removed: from US 23-441 south of Dillsboro to NC 107 * New name given "NC 107 Connector"
2008	Citizens Information Workshop: * Improvements to existing NC 107 identified as "needed." * Held at Western Carolina University * Discussed: * NC 107 Connector Project * Upgrades needed on existing roads * Need for new route * Potential negative effects of new route on businesses, community and the environment
2009	Public Workshop: * Held by Jackson County Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP), October 13, 2009
2009	NCDOT adopted "Complete Streets" policy: * When building or improving existing roads, this policy directs the Department to "consider and incorporate different modes of transportation, including walking, biking, and public transit."
2010	Citizens Information Workshop: * Discussed comments for next NC 107 feasibility Study, November 9, 2010
2010	Jackson County CTP: * Approved/adopted proposed upgrades to existing NC 107 and US 23 business
2011	NCDOT completed the second feasibility study: * Considered means to handle traffic through the year 2035 * Evaluated potential upgrades to existing NC 107 and US 23 business * Analysis included NC 107 Connector (STIP Project R-4745) * Concluded NC 107 connector would help reduce traffic on NC 107, yet would NOT completely solve the transportation needs.
2012	Southwestern Regional Planning Organization (SWRPO): * Completed NC 107 Corridor Study to identify community goals for upgrading NC 107 * Ranked NC 107 as "Funding Priority" * Included community goas for upgrading NC 107
2013	NCDOT and SWRPO ranks upgrades to existing NC 107 over NC 107 Connector: * Upgrades to NC 107 again deemed the "Funding Priority" over the "NC 107 Connector." * Thus, NC 107 Connector project was removed from Jackson County's CTP and replaced with current R-5600 NC 107 and US 23 Business project

2015	Traffic Management Plan: * Completed plan to control traffic during construction * Utilities second feasibility study to address constructability of new R-5600 project
2015	Public Meeting (May 18, 2015) * Reviewed Traffic Management Study * Project history
